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DCH RESPONDS TO GSRA REPORT THAT SHBP IS 'BROKE'

The Department of Community Health has responded to our June Newsletter report on the financial condition of the State Health Benefit Plan, stating that the \$433 million negative balance we reported (as of April 30) should have been a negative of only \$245 million. DCH reports that the information provided to GSRA contained incorrect information because:

The financial expenditures were inflated by \$188 million as a result of the method of recording Health Reimbursement Account Expenditures.

In addition to DCH changing the expenditure amount, it requested additional funds through transfer to the SHBP. In June, the Legislative Fiscal Affairs Committee approved a transfer of \$33.3 million from another program to the SHBP.

When the \$33.3 million transfer from the State Treasury is added to the May 31, 2010, SHBP Balance Sheet the Cash Net Worth is \$19.2 million and the Accrual Net Worth is negative by only \$218.5 million. The information supplied by DCH for May 31st plus the \$33.3 million is as follows.

Although DCH states that cash is available to pay all claims, the fact remains that by reducing the state contribution, \$980 million that would have been retained by the SHBP has been used for other State budget items. Also, the fact remains that the SHBP is insolvent on an accrual

basis. For the first time since the 1962 inception of the SHBP, there are insufficient reserves to cover the IBNR liabilities. Such policy leaves the plan and members at risk for a surge in claims for which the cash is not available to pay.

GSRA will continue to monitor the financial reports made available by the DCH. When the June 30th information is available, GSRA will provide an update on the Plan.

<u>DCH's response to GSRA's June report is contained</u> in a document entitled "SHBP Budget Talking Points" and is reprinted below:

While the State Health Benefit Plan is not currently funded at historical levels, it is important to note that all health benefit claims and plan vendors are being paid.

In order to address declining state revenues, state budgets have been reduced over the last three fiscal years. One strategy to help balance the state budget has been to reduce SHBP reserves through lower contributions to the plan. In addition, the plan has experienced lower revenue growth as a result of employee retirements, layoffs, and furloughs, as well as higher claims costs. As a result, the plan is not currently funded to support all Incurred But Not Reported (IBNR) claim liabilities.

The financial strength of the SHBP and the benefit to employees and retirees is of the highest importance to the Department. The SHBP has taken steps to maintain a positive cash balance while longer-term solutions are being identified, including:

- 1. The plan received an additional \$33.3 million from the treasury in June 2010.
- 2. The board approved an increase in employer contributions effective July to September 2010.
- 3. SHBP has applied, through the Early Retiree Reinsurance Program of the Affordable Health

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- Care Act, for grant money to offset some of the future claims costs of early retirees.
- 4. The May 31, 2010 unaudited Balance Sheet reflects a Fund Balance of negative \$254 million which includes an unfunded IBNR of \$237.6 million.

The plan's April 30, 2010 Net Worth as reported in the Georgia State Retiree Association June 30, 2010 newsletter is understated by over \$188 million due to a cumulative rather than monthly recording of Health Reimbursement Account expenditures. Once corrected the plan's Net Worth as of April 30, 2010 is negative \$245 million. This negative \$245 million Net Worth represents the lack of funding to cover IBNR liabilities."

On July 19, 2010, Craig Schneider of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution authored an article regarding the SHBP and the potential impact of its potential inability to pay health insurance claims. The article stated that a spokesman for Governor Sonny Perdue assures the members that the fund would continue to pay all claims. LARGEST HOSPITAL IN CENTRAL GEORGIA CANCELS ITS UNITED HEALTH CARE OPEN ACCESS PLAN PROVIDER CONTRACT

GSRA has learned that Macon's Medical Center of Central Georgia (MCCG) has cancelled its provider contract with United Healthcare that is used for the State Health Benefit Plan's OAP option. This action will primarily affect active employees and retirees under age 65. SHBP members who are enrolled in the OAP option and who normally receive medical services (except for emergencies) at MCCG are urged to call ahead before seeking medical care at MCCG. Please note that at the current time this contract cancellation does NOT affect retirees over age 65 and who are enrolled in the United Healthcare's Medicare Advantage Plan (MAPFFS).

SHBP Division Chief Resigns – New Appointee Named
DCH announced at the July 10th Board of Community Health meeting that SHBP Division Chief Nancy
Goldstein resigned her position with DCH in mid-July to accept an opportunity in the private sector. The DCH
Commissioner appointed Trudie Nacin, formerly Deputy Chief of SHBP, as Division Chief of SHBP.

SHBP Membership Update

A familiar cry in today's political environment is, "cut state spending." Unfortunately, cutting spending means furloughs to reduce the cost of salaries for and reducing the number of employees, teachers, and other school personnel. Such reductions in State Government and local school systems also reduce the state's contribution to the State Health Benefit Plan. In fact, reducing the number creates a double whammy for the SHBP.

In threatened layoffs or furloughs, long-service employees and teachers often decide to retire, allowing the state or school system to employ a less experienced replacement at a lower salary; or to simply leave the position vacant. As a result, total personnel expenditures are reduced. Reduced personnel expenditures mean that the amount of employer contribution to the State Health Benefit Plan (which is calculated as a percentage of salaries paid) decreases. But the cost of continuing to provide retirees' health insurance stays the same. Given these facts, GSRA asked the Department of Community Health for a report showing the enrollment statistics for July, 2010. The following table shows that there was a net loss of 2,836 members (4,781 with dependents) during the last six months. Active members decreased by 5,448 while the number of retirees increased by 2,612.

In order to reduce the benefit cost of the SHBP, DCH adopted a goal to persuade members to transfer to Consumer Driven Health Plans—the Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) and the High Deductible Health Plan (HDHP). In addition, DCH changed policy to offer only the CDHP options to new SHBP members and adopted premium policies that drove most Medicare eligible retirees to transfer to a Medicare Advantage Plan Private Fee for Service option on January 1, 2010.

The table above shows that DCH has succeeded in moving members to one of the CDHP plans and transferring retiree's age 65+ to a MAP option. CDHP options now populate 31.16% (28.84% plus 2.32%) and MAP populates 52.29% of all retirees (but 97% of the age 65+).

Employees Retirement System Board of Trustees Secretary Report

Executive Director Pamela Pharris, serving as Secretary to the ERS Board of Trustees, distributed a report to the Board at the June 24th meeting. Although the full report is posted to the ERS website, a few facts have been extracted from the report with comparative information.

Active employees are fewer than in FY 2009; thereby decreasing the employer contribution to ERS; and the number of retirees has increased in FY 2010 resulting in increased pension payments.
