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ERS BOARD MEETS, CONTINUES TO DELAY DECISION ON FY '24 BENEFIT does not address prior decision to deny benefit adjustments to under age 45 disability retirees; ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

At its regular June 15 meeting, the ERS Board received the usual secretary's report including an update on legislation and election of officers for FY '24. These are Homer Bryson, Chair, and Frank Thach, Vice Chair, both of whom are trustees who are elected by the other trustees. During the secretary's report, Executive Director Jim Potvin's comments included the following:

- HB 317, which would allow retirees' beneficiaries to assign portions of the retirees' benefits to funeral homes for retirees' funeral expenses, passed out of the General Assembly, but the Governor vetoed the bill. ERS had lobbied against the bill, and Mr. Potvin had not expected the veto, but is pleased with the result.
- The FY '23 one-time benefit adjustment will be about \$525. It will be distributed before the end of June.
- The decision on how to distribute the anticipated FY '24 annual benefit adjustment will not be made until the Board's annual meeting next April, assuming that the \$26.75 million appropriated for this purpose will still be available. Mr. Potvin informed the Board that he interprets the governor's message to disregard legislative intent for the appropriation to mean that the funding is still available, but that the General Assembly cannot dictate how the Board will distribute it.

Prior to the meeting, like prior to the last meeting, GSRA had requested to address the Board. For both meetings, GSRA advocated for two actions to benefit our members. First, we requested that the FY '24 appropriation be distributed as soon as administratively possible and that the decision not be put off until next April. Those many retirees whose benefits are insufficient to meet their financial obligations need help as soon as they can get it. Given that the State is projected to have a substantial surplus this year on top of the huge surpluses of the last two years, we do not share the concern that the \$26.75 million may not be available for its intended purpose.

However, we do agree that there is good reason for a short delay in the Board granting the FY '24 adjustment, and that is that neither the staff nor the Board have decided in what manner the adjustment should be granted. Director Potvin informed us that ERS will form a working group to study alternatives and related issues and develop a recommendation for the Board's consideration. In a very positive note, he has invited GSRA to provide members to participate in this working group.

The second matter which we advocated to the Board is that it reconsider its decision to deny eligibility for benefit adjustments to disability retirees under the age of 45. We do not understand why this decision was made, particularly since the Board granted eligibility to such retirees in other plans.



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Like before the last meeting, GSRA's request to address the Board was again denied. This time we were informed of the possibility of being able to address the Board at either its October or December meetings, and maybe again at the February meeting.

Also, just as prior to the last meeting, GSRA sent messages to the Board which we requested that ERS management pass on to the trustees. We do not know if these requests were accommodated for either meeting.

The Board also again denied in-person attendance at its meeting for public observers. The public has had virtual access to the meeting via Zoom since the Board began limiting in-person attendance due to public health concerns during the pandemic. We understand that the Board will consider in-person attendance for FY '24 now that the public health emergency has passed.

At one point, as many as 193 people had signed on to the meeting on Zoom, which should convey to the Board that ERS beneficiaries are engaged and interested in its work on our behalf. Thank you to all those who took the time to "attend" and let your presence and interest be known.

GSRA TO JOIN WITH ERS IN DETERMINING BEST METHOD FOR DISTRIBUTING FY '24 ANNUAL BENEFIT TO RETIREES

In discussing with us the distribution of the \$26.75 million appropriated for annual benefit adjustments in FY '24, ERS Executive Director Jim Potvin told us that the board had not settled on a best way for doing that. He said that he was going to name a "working group" to develop a recommendation. At our request, Director Potvin agreed to add some GSRA members to the group. He will meet with GSRA representatives early next month. We welcome this opportunity to collaborate with ERS on this important issue. We will report on progress no later than the July newsletter.

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Top of Mind: On the Outside Looking In

I logged on to the June ERS Board meeting a little early, just to avoid the last-minute rush and to make sure that the Zoom platform hadn't launched any last minute "updates" that would delay my entry to the meeting.

While the staff and trustees were gathering for the meeting, I could hear casual chitchat among some of the trustees: about people they knew in common, who had been having health problems, snook-fishing in Florida. I couldn't tell who was talking, but I learned something about them as they were learning about each other. Through casual, informal conversation. It's how relationships are formed and sustained, even among a board of trustees.

In years past, some of us would have been in the room and might have joined in on that snook fishing conversation. (At least two of our GSRA board members are avid fishermen.) As Chuck Freedman's lead article indicates, however, virtual attendance has been our only option to observe or participate in the Board meetings since the pandemic began. The current practice is to mute the audio and block the camera image of those Zoom participants who are considered "observers."

As the pandemic emergency ended, most business and government agencies resumed full operations. Continuing to limit public attendance at ERS Board meetings, offering the public virtual access only, seems to send a message: we generally are to be neither seen nor heard by the Trustees and staff during these meetings.

About 190 people in total logged in to the June 15th meeting on Zoom. Many names were familiar as GSRA members, but except for the tally of participants' names, we may as well not have been there.

I compared and contrasted this experience with what we encountered at the Capitol during this last Session. Capitol complex security measures continue in force, but constituents were all over the place. Limitations on gatherings in the Rotunda this year caused us to try a different style legislative event after not having had one for several years. But it worked out well. We enjoyed some good "face time" with a number of legislators who accepted our invitation for a conference-room lunch. It was another instance of people having the opportunity to learn about each other through casual conversation.



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The General Assembly, for all of its foibles, has embraced a measure of transparency by doing much of the people's business in full view of the people themselves. With the 2023 session, the legislators resumed their floor sessions and committee meetings much as they always have conducted them in pre-pandemic years. The sessions and meetings also are live-streamed, recorded, and archived for future viewing on demand.

We again attended many committee meetings in person. Even if we didn't always speak, our legislative team most often had opportunities to talk with the legislators casually...because we were in the room. Over time these informal encounters have fostered relationships that have contributed significantly to GSRA's steady progress in achieving our legislative objectives.

Our legislators understand the power of relationships. In fact, they know that their service as elected officials very much depends on them.

"A fiduciary is a person or organization that acts on behalf of another person or persons, *putting their* clients' interests ahead of their own, with a duty to preserve good <u>faith</u> and trust. Being a fiduciary thus requires being bound both legally and ethically to act in the other's best interests." Fiduciary Definition: Examples and Why They Are Important (investopedia.com]

In contrast, some of the ERS Trustees are executive appointees and the rest are elected by fellow trustees, with little meaningful input from plan members/beneficiaries, and by and large, with little, if any, contact with them. Continuing to restrict the public's physical access to Board meetings gives the *appearance* that Trustees are reluctant to interact directly with plan members and beneficiaries, to whom they owe the fiduciary duties of loyalty and care.

Trustees are to place the interests of all plan members and beneficiaries above their own interests, *and those of any third parties*, including, dare I say, even the authorities who appointed them. And this is where things must get really complicated for the Trustees. It must be difficult for them to hew to this exacting standard of loyalty to people whom they mostly only "know" as faceless names on a Zoom screen.

We've requested several times that physical access to the meetings be opened back up as public health concerns have subsided. We have been told a decision would be made by the "next" Board meeting, so we are asking one more time that the meetings be re-opened to the public.

Retirees' emotions run high over the stagnation and erosion of our pension benefits, the impact of sustained inflation, worsened by the long-time lack of significant annual cost of living adjustments (COLAs/raises). But Since GSRA was formed 16+ years ago and members began attending ERS

Board meetings, there has not been one incidence of inappropriate behavior, not one angry outburst or



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disruption of any kind. I can't imagine it happening now. While we are passionate about our issues, I can't conceive of any of our members behaving in any other than a respectful manner.

Besides, most of us are getting too old for marching in the streets, or laying siege to the Capitol and ERS headquarters, carrying placards, torches and pitchforks. We just want an opportunity to interact with the people who are *charged and entrusted* with the administration of our trust fund and our benefits. And for them to see us as real people and not adversaries. We are not out of line for expecting access to and accountability from those who owe us those fiduciary duties of loyalty and care.
